COLLECT for The Fourth Sunday of Epiphany

God of heaven, you send the gospel to the ends of the earth and your messengers to every nation: send your Holy Spirit to transform us by the good news of everlasting life in Jesus Christ our Lord.

In Matthew's Gospel, as Jesus sits on the hillside and opens his mouth to teach, the world quietly turns upside down.

"Blessed are the poor in spirit... blessed are those who mourn... blessed are the meek." These are not the virtues our age applauds. We admire confidence, self-assertion and success. We avoid weakness, grief and dependence. Yet Jesus looks upon those very places we try to hide and says, 'There...there is the doorway to the kingdom of heaven.'

The Beatitudes are not a set of sayings, nor a moral ladder we must climb. They are first a revelation of Jesus himself. He is the poor in spirit who depends wholly on the Father. He is the man of sorrows who mourns a broken world. He is gentle and lowly of heart. To know Jesus is to recognise that God's reign comes not through strength but through surrender, not through trying to do better but through grace.

This is both deeply unsettling and wonderfully freeing. If blessing belongs to the self-sufficient, then many of us are lost. But if blessing belongs to those who know their need, then hope is nearer than we think. The kingdom of God is not a reward for the impressive; it is a gift for the hungry.

Jesus does not call us to admire this upside-down kingdom from a distance, instead he calls us to enter it, to repent but also to rest. To lay down our coping and allow him to meet us in our poverty of spirit, our grief, our longing for righteousness. There, in the very places we fear, we find Christ himself.

May the Spirit give us ears to hear this strange good news, hearts soft enough to receive it, and courage to follow Jesus into the blessing of his upside-down kingdom.

BIBLE READINGS

Verses of prophecy from the book of Isaiah 61:1-3

1 The Spirit of the Sovereign Lord is on me, because the Lord has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim freedom for the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners, 2 to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour and the day of vengeance of our God, to comfort all who mourn, 3 and provide for those who grieve in Zion – to bestow on them a crown of beauty instead of ashes, the oil of joy instead of mourning, and a garment of praise instead of a spirit of despair. They will be called oaks of righteousness, a planting of the Lord for the display of his splendour.

Matthew 5:1-12

1 Now when Jesus saw the crowds, he went up on a mountainside and sat down. His disciples came to him, 2 and he began to teach them. He said: 3 'Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. 4 Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. 5 Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. 6 Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled. 7 Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy. 8 Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God. 9 Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God. 10 Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. 11 'Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me. 12 Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.

New Preaching Series Sunday: Isaiah Fulfilled – Meeting Jesus in

Matthew's Gospel We will be focussing on the eye-witness account of Jesus in Matthew's gospel and seeing how he deliberately frames Jesus as the fulfilment of the prophecies given through Isaiah some 700 years earlier.

As we begin 2026, would you renew your commitment to pray and please pray for the strengthening of their faith and a deepening hope in God, that they may be filled with joy and peace as they trust in Him, knowing He has a purpose and a future for them.

Holy Communion – Each dipping their own wafer – unfortunately this practice may not continue. I realise this may be distressing for those who have been doing this now for some while since the pandemic and I apologise for not picking up on this before now. However the Church of England's guidance states that ordinary communicants should not dip the consecrated bread into the chalice themselves. This is because it is not an authorised Anglican practice in the normal liturgy of Holy Communion. Receiving in one kind (just bread or wine) when necessary still counts as full communion. Dipping by communicants is considered unhygienic and increases the risk of contamination of the chalice with germs or gluten from the bread, which could affect others.
