COLLECT for The Second Sunday of Epiphany

Almighty God, you have created the heavens and the earth and made us in your own image: teach us to discern your hand in all your works and your likeness in all your children; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit reigns supreme over all things, now and forever.

Testimony catch up... did you miss last Sunday's testimony? Here it is:
A few years ago we rented a cottage in Wharfedale Yorkshire. The nearest building was a barn.

After supper we went straight to bed. During the night M went to the bathroom. The light switch on the landing wasn't at the top of the stairs but was located a good way down. In trying to locate it M slipped and shot down the stairs and hit the wall at the bottom.

I woke up and put the bedroom light on as M staggered in. To say his face as a mess was an understatement. We couldn't phone 999 as there was no signal for our mobiles. But the owner of the cottage had left a book with helpful addresses. We decided to go to the hospital which was 30 miles away. There was also a map. When daylight came we left. M insisted on driving, leaving me to mop him up as he was bleeding heavily so I wasn't paying attention to the route.

We arrived at the hospital and M went into shock. He was taken away on a trolley. After a while a doctor found me and said M was going in an ambulance to another hospital where a plastic surgeon would be waiting for him. I wasn't allowed to go with him so I spent the day at the original hospital, I didn't do too badly – roast beef and Yorkshire puds on the menu!

When he was brought back it was dusk. I was told I couldn't stay at the hospital. I so I had to return to the cottage as they were keeping him overnight. So I got in the car and tried not to panic. It was dark by now and I didn't know the route as I hadn't been concentrating on the journey there. I had been concentrating on M. So I put a worship CD on and sang along with it. I prayed to Jesus and said, 'Please help me'. I felt a sense of peace wash over me and I knew it would be alright. So Jesus and I left together. I didn't hear an audible voice but in my head I knew which turning to take each time and eventually we got to the cottage. Normally I would have been nervous on my own in a strange place I don't know but I knew I wasn't alone, Jesus was with me. I slept well and next day got up and with Jesus' help returned to the hospital. Again, no audible voice but guidance in my head. Parking was never

my strong point but when we arrived, there was a parking space right in front of me and I drove straight into it.

It then struck me how putting my trust in Jesus Christ had helped me and guided me. Without him I couldn't have done it. He is trustworthy as I found out then, and many times since. Anna

Matthew 6. 25-end

Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? 26 Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? 27 Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life? 28 'And why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labour or spin. 29 Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendour was dressed like one of these. 30 If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will he not much more clothe you – you of little faith? 31 So do not worry, saying, "What shall we eat?" or "What shall we drink?" or "What shall we wear?" 32 For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. 33 But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. 34 Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Next week's services: Family service at 9.30 & Parish Communion at 11.00.

Holy Communion – Each dipping their own wafer – unfortunately this practice may not continue. I realise this may be distressing for those who have been doing this now for some while since the pandemic and I apologise for not picking up on this before now. However the Church of England's guidance states that ordinary communicants should not dip the consecrated bread into the chalice themselves. This is because it is not an authorised Anglican practice in the normal liturgy of Holy Communion. Receiving in one kind (just bread or wine) when necessary still counts as full communion. Dipping by communicants is considered unhygienic and increases the risk of contamination of the chalice with germs or gluten from the bread, which could affect others.

News from Bishop Martin, Rt Reverend Martin Warner writes: I shall retire from office on 31 May this year. It has been an enormous privilege to work with so many gifted and committed people during my time in Chichester. I shall always be grateful for our partnership in apostolic mission and will hold this joyful household of faith in my prayers as its future unfolds. The diocese seems to be in good heart after the 950 celebrations. A new diocesan bishop will bring fresh vision and energy, and be supported by a strong, gifted, confident team which is committed to the quality of Christian life in our schools, our parishes, and outreach to those in need. There are well-established protocols for a diocesan vacancy and appointing a new bishop. Discussion about this is now taking shape. There is little that will change in terms of day-to-day life in the diocese. The suffragan bishops will together oversee the life of the diocese during the vacancy. They have decided that Bishop Will is to take on the formal duties of acting bishop, subject to consultation with the Bishop's Council.
