BIBLE READINGS

Psalm 81

1 Sing for joy to God our strength; shout aloud to the God of Jacob! 2 Begin the music, strike the tambourine, play the melodious harp and lyre. 3 Sound the ram's horn at the New Moon, and when the moon is full, on the day of our Feast; 4 this is a decree for Israel, an ordinance of the God of Jacob. 5 When God went out against Egypt, he established it as a statute for Joseph. I heard an unknown voice say: 6 'I removed the burden from their shoulders; their hands were set free from the basket. 7 In your distress you called and I rescued you, I answered you out of a thundercloud; I tested you at the waters of Meribah. 8 Hear me, my people, and I will warn you – if you would only listen to me, Israel! 9 You shall have no foreign god among you; you shall not worship any god other than me. 10 I am the Lord your God, who brought you up out of Egypt. Open wide your mouth and I will fill it. 11 'But my people would not listen to me; Israel would not submit to me. 12 So I gave them over to their stubborn hearts to follow their own devices. 13 'If my people would only listen to me, if Israel would only follow my ways, 14 how quickly I would subdue their enemies and turn my hand against their foes! 15 Those who hate the Lord would cringe before him, and their punishment would last for ever. 16 But you would be fed with the finest of wheat; with honey from the rock I would satisfy you.'

Luke 22: 31-34 & 54-62

31 'Simon, Simon, Satan has asked to sift all of you as wheat. 32 But I have prayed for you, Simon, that your faith may not fail. And when you have turned back, strengthen your brothers.' 33 But he replied, 'Lord, I am ready to go with you to prison and to death.' 34 Jesus answered, 'I tell you, Peter, before the cock crows today, you will deny three times that you know me.'

54 Then seizing him, they led him away and took him into the house of the high priest. Peter followed at a distance. 55 And when some there had kindled a fire in the middle of the courtyard and had sat down together, Peter sat down with them. 56 A servant-girl saw him seated there in the firelight. She looked closely at him and said, 'This man was with him.' 57 But he denied it. 'Woman, I don't know him,' he said. 58 A little later someone

else saw him and said, 'You also are one of them.' 'Man, I am not!' Peter replied.

59 About an hour later another asserted, 'Certainly this fellow was with him, for he is a Galilean.' 60 Peter replied, 'Man, I don't know what you're talking about!' Just as he was speaking, the cock crowed. 61 The Lord turned and looked straight at Peter. Then Peter remembered the word the Lord had spoken to him: 'Before the cock crows today, you will disown me three times.' 62 And he went outside and wept bitterly.

John 21: 15-19

15 When they had finished eating, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?' 'Yes, Lord,' he said, 'you know that I love you.' Jesus said, 'Feed my lambs.' 16 Again Jesus said, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He answered, 'Yes, Lord, you know that I love you.' Jesus said, 'Take care of my sheep.' 17 The third time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter was hurt because Jesus asked him the third time, 'Do you love me?' He said, 'Lord, you know all things; you know that I love you.' Jesus said, 'Feed my sheep. 18 Very truly I tell you, when you were younger you dressed yourself and went where you wanted; but when you are old you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will dress you and lead you where you do not want to go.' 19 Jesus said this to indicate the kind of death by which Peter would glorify God. Then he said to him, 'Follow me!'

August Days - from War to Peace

August is a time when many of us have in various ways pressed pause on the usual rhythm of life. As we do we may find ourselves reflecting on and reassessing the direction of our lives and we might find ourselves posing life's bigger questions - What am I living for? Where can lasting peace be found? This August as the country marked 80 years since the end of World War II, now is also a moment to give thanks for that hard-fought peace, but also to remember the deeper peace so many found in its aftermath.

The account of Mitsuo Fuchida, the lead pilot in the attack on Pearl Harbour, testifies to this sort of peace. Fuchida was a man of honour, pride, and military achievement yet, in post-war Japan, he found himself grappling with a deep sense of emptiness. A short pamphlet written by Jacob DeShazer, an American airman once imprisoned by the Japanese, changed everything for Fuchida. It told of how DeShazer found forgiveness for his captors after encountering Christ through reading a Bible in a prison cell.

That testimony profoundly affected Fuchida and he bought a Bible for himself. In it he read the words of Jesus on the cross, 'Father, forgive them...' and he realised that Christ had died even for him and in April 1950 Fuchida put his trust in Jesus. From then until his death, he no longer plotted war but instead preached about the peace that only Christ can give.

King George VI, during the war, gave a Bible to all serving members of the armed forces. He wrote, 'To many it will prove a source of strength, as it has done for countless others before us. In the darkest days of the war, I know it was so to me.' Across the centuries, and in every generation, people have found that same strength and peace. Here in Wick this year, we have seen individuals, some who are long-standing churchgoers, others newly welcomed, discovering that same settled peace in Jesus Christ.

Whether in a prison camp, a busy seaside town or a quiet village, that peace is still available today. As Jesus himself promised, 'Seek, and you will find' and just as Fuchida and DeShazer discovered, true forgiveness, real purpose, and unshakeable peace are found only in Jesus.
